The Finance Minister AMA Muhith on Wednesday underscored the need for undertaking joint effort of different types of stakeholders along with the government initiatives with a view to tackling natural disaster across the country.

"Co-ordination of various stakeholders is needed to overcome the natural calamities in the country" said the minister while addressing a meeting on 'Good Practices around the world on Inclusive DRR and Humanitarian Actions' at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre (BICC) in Dhaka.

The session was organized on the occasion of three day- long International Conference on 'Disability and Disaster Risk Management' which was inaugurated by the Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on Tuesday. Addressing as the chief guest, the minister said the international conference is consolidating both disability and disaster management is one sphere which are very important from the perspective of Bangladesh.

"There is a myth that we have many disable people but the fact is that the number of disable people is only about 100,000 (One Hundred Thousand) people in the country",

said Muhith.

Disability Inclusion practices should be settled, he said.

He asserted that delegates and activists will be benefited by attending this session.

"We should comprehend long term planning for reducing disaster risks to save the life and properties of the people", he said.

1.8 pc GDP loss for disaster every year: Tofail

Some 1.8 per cent of the gross domestic product (GDP) loss is occurring due to natural disasters of the country, said the Commerce minister Tofail Ahmed on Tuesday. 
